Subject: 2025 State Legislative Priorities Update #3

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receives an update on the City's 2025 State Legislative Agenda.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

- The 2025 Legislative Session began on January 13, 2025, for a 105-day session during which the legislature will adopt the 2025-2027 budgets and legislation covering a wide variety of policy areas.
- Council's Legislative Workgroup (LWG) meet weekly throughout the legislative session, during which they established position recommendations (Attachment 2) on bills reviewed by the City's subject matter experts and identified policy areas for Council discussion.
- During the presentation, Council will have an opportunity to concur with or modify the position recommendations established by the LWG and discuss the policy areas raised by the LWG to guide the City's advocacy for the 2025 session.
- The updated attached bill report will now only include position recommendations that have been reviewed by the LWG.

BACKGROUND:

The State Legislature convened for its regular session on Monday January 13, 2025. This session, the first of the biennium, will be a long session of 105 days, concluding in April. To guide the work of the City during the legislative session, Council adopted the City's State Legislative Agenda for the 2025 legislative session (Attachment 1) through approval of Resolution 5659 at its November 19, 2024, meeting.

The City Council's Legislative Workgroup (LWG) meets weekly throughout session to track the status of the City's priorities and provides support and oversight of strategies to achieve the City's priorities. The LWG includes Councilmember Black, serving as chair, Mayor Curtis, and Councilmember Sweet. The LWG is staffed by the City Manager, Government Affairs Manager, Senior Management Analyst, with support from the City's contract lobbyists in Olympia.

During session, legislative proposals are introduced in Olympia daily by lawmakers in both the Senate and House. Any bills that are relevant to the Kirkland's legislative agenda or are city-related are flagged for review. These bills are assigned to department subject-matter advisors (SMAs) to review and determine potential impacts to the City. In this process, staff also make an initial assessment and recommendation on what the City's position might be on a given bill.

The City's Government Affairs team then provides reviewed bills, their analysis, and staff's recommendations to Council's LWG for further review. The LWG, whose activities are guided by the Council's adopted legislative agenda, discuss and finalize position recommendations for Council approval. Each Council meeting during session this updated list of recommendations is provided to the full Council for review. The Council may concur with or modify the recommendations.

The LWG considers the next week's committee schedule and discusses which appropriate action to take on behalf of the City at legislative committee hearings in Olympia. If, during the session, action on a proposed bill is determined to be beyond the scope of the Legislative Agenda, the LWG will bring the bill proposal before the full Council for consideration and discussion at its next regular council meeting. Reports of these actions or requests by the LWG for further discussion will be included in the presentation to Council.

Staff will provide a presentation at each regular Council meeting throughout session that includes a status update on the City's priorities, recaps actions taken by the LWG in alignment with the City's 2025 Legislative Agenda, provides an opportunity for Council to concur with or modify the position recommendations as established by the LWG (Attachment 2), and highlights legislation that the LWG have identified for discussion by Council.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

Since the last Council update on February 4, 2025, the LWG met on February 7, 2025, to review subject matter advisor analysis of pre-filed bills, finalize the recommended positions of those bills, discussed public hearing opportunities, discussed strategies to advance the City's priorities, and identified legislation for discussion at Council. At that meeting, the LWG did not identify any pieces of legislation for discussion at Council. Further topics for discussion at Council may be identified at the coming February 14, 2025, meeting of the LWG. Any such identified topics will be shared with Council as far in advance of the February 18, 2025, meeting as possible.

LWG Position Recommendation Report

The City's SMAs provide reviews on over 200 bills. To streamline LWG meetings, staff identify bills for discussion at the meetings that are scheduled for upcoming hearings, have been flagged by legislators or stakeholders for the City's input, or SMA position recommendations on the bill very across departments and the legislation has alignment with the City's Legislative Agenda. The LWG may verify or modify SMAs position recommendation based on state legislative dynamics, established priorities of Council, or to manage the LWG's efforts during session. The Council concurred with the recommendation to allow any Councilmember to move a position to "monitor" until the cut-off in the house of origin.

Historically, the LWG Position Recommendation Report that is shared as an attachment for each Council meeting during session includes legislation discussed by LWG and legislation that may not have been elevated for discussion. Legislation that was moved forward without discussion included position recommendations as made by SMAs. During the February 4, 2025, Council meeting, staff shared that the LWG would discuss the LWG Position Recommendation Report and identify some process changes to ensure the Council and public receive information that more accurately reflects the work completed by the LWG in their weekly meetings. The LWG discussed this item at their February 7, 2025, meeting and, to achieve the identified goals, will be providing a more streamlined but cumulative report that only includes legislation that the LWG has discussed. The report will no longer include recommendations from staff until they have been discussed by the LWG. Councilmembers can ask Diana Hart or Andreana Campbell for the staff recommendations on any bill not included in the updated report.

NEXT STEPS:

The LWG will incorporate any feedback or decisions made by Council on legislation into appropriate actions moving forward.

2025 Legislative Agenda



General Principles

Kirkland supports legislation that promotes the City Council's goals, plans, policies, and initiatives that enable Kirkland to provide basic municipal services and meet the needs of current and future community members.

- Protect shared State revenue sources available to the City and provide new revenue options and flexibility of existing revenues, such as revisiting the 1% property tax cap.
- Support the partnership between cities and the State to ensure that critical mandates are funded, and vital services are provided to all community members.
- Advance initiatives identified in the City's Work Program; Council Goals; Budget; Comprehensive Plan; Sustainability Strategic Plan; Transportation Strategic Plan; Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging 5year Roadmap; Housing Strategy Plan, and related documents.

2025 Legislative Priorities

Legislation that provides funding and policy tools to increase access to housing and expand the construction and preservation of moderate income-, low income-, and supportive-housing supply and essential supporting infrastructure, such as parks, transportation, services, and school capacity.

 Authorize an additional Real Estate Excise Tax (REET) increment using a graduated rate model with a high-value threshold, and extend Cities' flexibility to use existing REET for construction and preservation of affordable housing.

Legislation that addresses the behavioral health treatment crisis by increasing the capacity of the crisis response system, including workforce, and supporting local programs that connect individuals with needed care.

Legislation that preserves and expands policy and funding tools to support a safe and reliable transportation system for all users, including revenue sharing with local governments.

Legislation that implements the noise enforcement pilot in Kirkland to enable local jurisdictions to identify and reduce street racing and other loud vehicle uses, including the required equity analysis.

Legislation that funds grants for National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) compliant transportation projects to support Cities creating multimodal projects that also advance the region's water quality goals.

Legislation that extends producer responsibility for glass, packaging, and paper recycling.

Legislation that creates flexibility for local jurisdictions operating jails to align policies with national guidelines related to the selection of the gender of the officer performing body searches.
